## 2011 Votes to Repeal Health Care Reform

The following are key votes to both repeal and block funding for the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act of 2010 (“ACA”).

### 1. Repeal the Affordable Care Act

Rep. Cantor, R-VA, introduced the *Repealing the Job-Killing Health Care Law Act*, a bill that would repeal the ACA in its entirety. Repealing the ACA would negatively impact America’s seniors by revoking significant drug discounts for Medicare beneficiaries who fall in the Part D doughnut hole; revoking free annual check-ups and preventive screenings; revoking subsidies for employers who provide health care coverage for their retirees; and revoking Medicaid options that allow older Americans with chronic conditions to live at home rather than in institutions. The repeal bill passed 245 to 189. A **NO** vote is the pro-senior vote. H.R. 2, Roll Call No. 14, January 19, 2011.

## 2. Block Funding for Implementation of ACA

Rep. Rehberg, R-MT, introduced an amendment to H.R. 1 that would prohibit the use of funds to pay any employee, officer, contractor or grantee of any federal department or agency to implement the provisions of the ACA. The amendment passed 239-187. A **NO** vote is the pro-retiree vote. Amdt No. 575, H.R. 1, Roll Call No. 97, February 18, 2011.

## 2011 Votes on the Budget

The following are key votes on various budget proposals and their impact on Social Security and Medicare.

### 1. Ryan GOP Budget

Rep. Ryan, R-WI, proposed a U.S. government budget for fiscal year 2012. The Ryan budget would severely hurt America's seniors and retirees by privatizing Medicare; promoting rationing by private insurance companies; fast-tracking cuts to Social Security; and slashing support for seniors and the disabled in nursing homes. This resolution would also reconfigure Medicaid into a state block-grant program, while cutting the federal budget by an estimated \$6 trillion over a decade. The House voted to pass the Ryan budget 235-193. A **NO** vote is the pro-retiree vote. H. Con. Res. 34, Roll Call 277, April 15, 2011.

## 2. Cut, Cap, and Balance

Rep. Jason Chaffetz, R-UT, introduced the Cut, Cap, and Balance Act of 2011, a bill that cuts domestic spending dramatically, preserves the Bush tax cuts, and eventually would have lead to the end of Medicare and Social Security as we know it by raising the retirement age and sharply cutting benefits. The bill also contains an amendment to the Constitution that would tie the hands of future Congresses by capping spending on programs such as Social Security and Medicare. The bill passed 234-190. A NO vote is the pro-retiree vote. H.R. 2560, Roll Call 606, July 20, 2011.

### 3. Budget Control Act of 2011

#### *Final Debt Ceiling Deal*

The House voted in favor of the Budget Control Act of 2011, which lifts the debt ceiling by extending government borrowing power into 2013, immediately cuts \$400 billion in spending, and cuts \$1 trillion in discretionary spending by 2021. Troubling, however, is that the new law creates a so-called “Super Committee” on Capitol Hill to find an additional \$1.5 trillion in spending cuts by Thanksgiving. Media accounts have suggested that Social Security and Medicare could be top targets for this new panel, including lower Cost-of-Living Adjustments (COLAs), an increase in the Medicare eligibility age, and higher Medicare co-pays and premiums.
